Curriculum Matters Mathematics Faculty

Another school year has just begun – a year of learning, fun and challenges at one of the best schools in the country. A special welcome to all our new students in Year 7 and those entering Years 10 and 11. Sure, some of you were a little nervous to start with, but it only took a short time before you found your feet and made some new friends. You will also find the academic challenges a little daunting at first but again, I am sure you will rise to the level required for success very quickly.

MGS has created a reputation as a school with a proud tradition of educating young adults and the Mathematics Faculty has made a commitment to providing the best of opportunities to assist students in realising their potential. Following the tradition, this year we will continue to expand the horizons of our students engaging them in more challenging activities, old and new ones. Our internal competition "Matemagicians Corner" will continue to provide the warm-up for external tests (AMC, ICAS Mathematics) as well as the opportunity for students to work as a team and score points for the house they belong to. A Chess Club will be offered weekly for both informal games and preparing MGS students for next year's competitions. The Schools' Sharemarket Game which presented great interest for some of our students last year is back, again.

On a different note, Mathematics is good for calculating areas. In the maths class, you learn how to measure the area of a rectangle or a triangle. If you keep studying, you might learn how to find the area of a cube, pyramid or sphere! But what about a really tricky shape? For instance, how do you measure the area of a cat?



In 1967, two scientists shaved some cats so they could measure the size of their skin. They found that a cat's surface area was about the same size as four A4 sheets of paper. That's definitely one answer, but it's not the only answer.

Recently, two United States researchers looked at how different animals clean themselves. They realised that cats don't just clean their skin; they also clean their fur. So they posed the question: does adding hairs to a cat make its surface area much bigger?

The researchers imagined that each hair was a cone: thick at the base on the skin, and pointy at the end. They then found out how long and thick cat hairs are, and plugged those numbers into a cone formula. This gave them the surface area of one cat hair, which was very small.

But cats have lots of hairs, not just one. So the researchers then found out how many hairs were on each square centimetre of a cat's skin. They multiplied this by a cat's skin area to find out how many hairs it had. Finally, they multiplied the number of hairs by the area of each hair. The final result was a huge number. A typical cat has a surface area of three square metres: almost the size of a ping pong table, and ten times larger than the area of its skin. This might explain why cats spend so much of the day cleaning themselves!

And in case you are wondering why on earth anyone would want to know the surface area of a cat, here's why. By studying nature's ways of cleaning surfaces, researchers hope to work out how manufactured objects, such as electronic sensors and robots, can be kept free of the dust and dirt that can cause breakdowns.

Here is a puzzle to apply your knowledge of surface area.

I have eight cube dice, each one centimetre wide. I've arranged them into a larger cube, two centimetres across. Then I removed one of the dice. Did removing one dice increase or decrease the surface area?


National Harmony Day

PDHPE lessons

Students have been enjoying their practical lessons with Years 7/8 completing a unit of work on fitness testing and understanding the associated benefits of being fit.

Year 10 have been loving their Invasion game unit looking at developing their skills in touch rugby.



Year 9 have been completing a unit on striking and fielding improving their understanding and skills on cricket.

A National Campaign has been implemented by the Australian Government to encourage young girls to be active and participate in sport.

SHOCK research that teenage girls in Australia face an epidemic of chronic conditions including depression, obesity and osteoporosis unless they get active has prompted a new campaign urging girls to stop abandoning exercise.

The majority of teenage girls in Australia — nearly 60 per cent of girls aged 15 to 17, now report little or no exercise according to new research.



That compares with 38 per cent of teenage boys, many of whom continue to play team sports throughout high school.



The research suggests social media including Facebook and watching TV is replacing team sports and exercise outdoors with devastating impacts.



Women are also more likely to be overweight than men from their teenage years, with 43 per cent of those aged 18-24 overweight or obese. By the age of 25, the majority of Australian women, 62.5 per cent are now overweight. A whopping 80 per cent of Australian women are overweight after the age of 45.

The \$10 million campaign to be launched by Health Minister Sussan Ley called #girlsmakeyourmove will warn girls and parents that the decision to opt out of regular exercise can have lifelong impacts.

"Physical activity in the teenage years lays down the muscle and bone you need for the rest of your life."

Ms Ley said,

"It will also help us to tackle a serious "epidemic" of diseases and chronic conditions facing this current generation if they do not exercise more.

It doesn't have to be intense exercise or even joining a team. Even moderate gentle exercise reduces your risk of cardiovascular disease, type II diabetes, colon cancer, obesity and even just minor injuries.

Regular forms of activity also help manage stress, alleviate depression and anxiety, strengthen self-esteem, enhance mood and boost mental alertness.

"We know, for girls, exercise and physical activity is the number one way to prevent illnesses later in life, like osteoporosis, which affects almost one quarter of all Australian women aged over 50," Ms Ley said.


