ANZAC Day Commemoration

On the 27 of April students from Macquarie Grammar School took part in commemorating ANZAC Day. ANZAC Day or the 25th of April marks the anniversary of Australian, New Zealand, British and French soldiers landing on the beaches of Gallipoli in Turkey. Many people believe that Gallipoli was just another battle fought in the First World War but to Australia it was much more, Gallipoli was the first major battle Australians fought as a nation with soldiers enlisting and volunteering from all states of Australia.



Gallipoli lasted for eight (8) and a half months, consuming the lives of 7,600 Australians and 2,500 New Zealander soldiers, and as if those numbers weren't enough another 24,000 young men were injured. Most of the time these numbers would seem very distant to modern society as the ANZACs are sometimes made out to be hardened soldiers ready for war, but in actual fact they were fathers, brothers and friends just like us. Among the wounded lies James Martin an Australian who

enlisted and first set foot on the shores of Gallipoli in September 1915 and was part of the 21st battalion. James died on the 25th of October, at the tender age of 14.





We lost the fight at Gallipoli and to this day people still ask why we celebrate it? The answer is, we don't. In my five (5) years of cadets, there was one major point that was always made clear, we don't celebrate memorial days such as ANZAC Day, we commemorate, thank and respect the men and women who took part and fought and died for people like us, back home.

Along with the help of the SRC (Student Representative Council) they raised funds to donate to a charity named Legacy. This charity helps the families of our veteran soldiers recover from their grief and pain to help their children deal with the trauma of losing an immediate family member.

Message from the Director of Welfare and Operations

As the year progresses and students feel more familiar with their courses and teachers, some students will begin to become

complacent. It is easy to lose sight of goals and go through the motions each day and even each week. Students need to stop and reflect now on how they are traveling academically. Are they on track to reach their goals? Do goals need reviewing? Do new strategies need to be put in place to help achieve these goals?

Most people do not multitask that well. Give me more than one item to think about, and I usually struggle to remember what I was doing before. Efficiency is usually lost with multitasking. In other words, take on one task at a time.

When you notice your child rushing through their homework, show them she/he needs to take more time checking and rechecking their work, before she/he delves into their other assignments. On the other hand, sometimes it is good to switch gears. If she/he has spent hours studying for one subject, suggest she/he switch over to another. Do you ever

think about what you're thinking? Too often we let our mind run loose without even realizing what's going on. If your wandering mind has busted through your immediate task, then get out your "rope" and lasso your thoughts back to where they should be. Encourage your child to take notes. When I take the time to record what I'm reading, it reinforces new facts, helping me to concentrate.

In addition to just learning facts, show your child how she/he can relate what she/he has learned. For example, rather than just learning formulas for finding areas of shapes, have her/him measure something around the home. This will make Maths more realistic and applicable to them.

After your child has completed all their homework, reward them with some free time or a favourite treat. Just having an incentive to look forward to, helps her/him get through her/his homework. These are just a few pointers in helping students improve their concentration. As their concentration improves, so will their grades. And, as an added bonus, they may apply these techniques to everything else in life that requires concentration. One can always hope!
