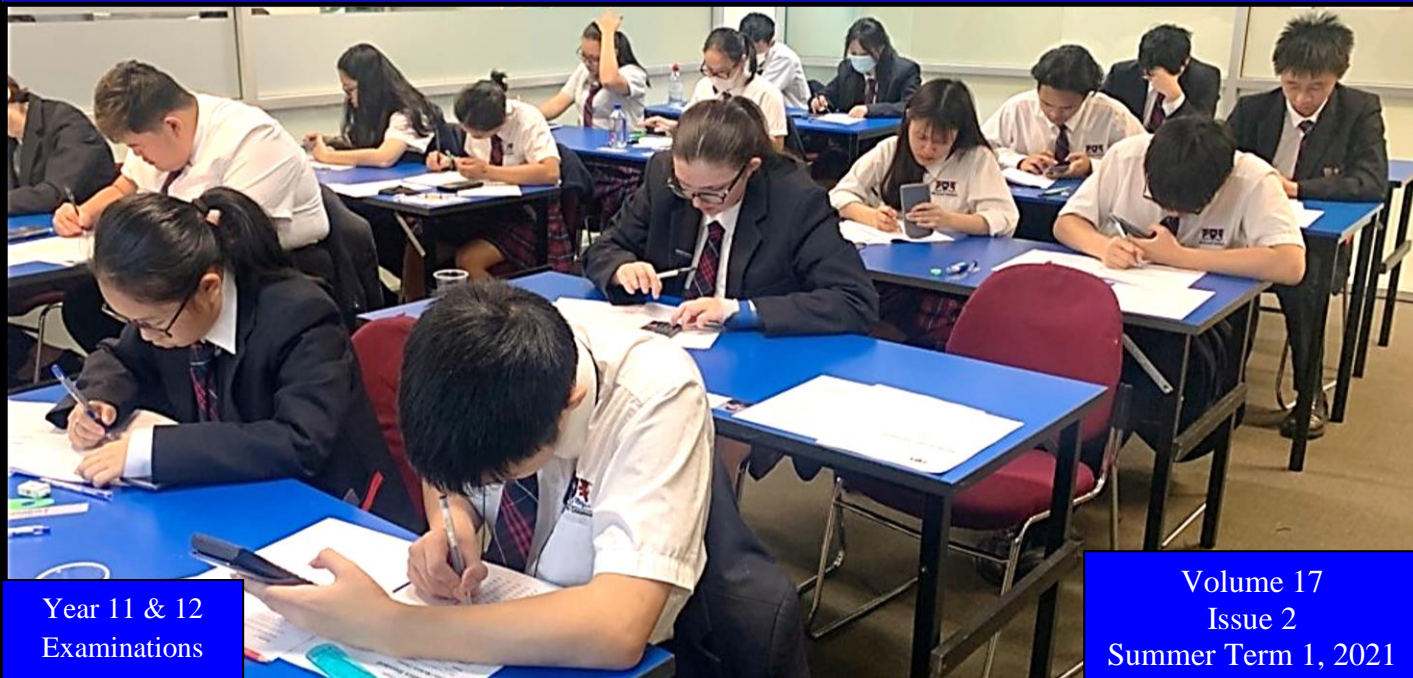

The 2021 Parliament of NSW Young Women's Leadership Seminar

On Monday the 8th of March, it was International Women's Day, and both Nadia and I had the privilege of being drawn from a ballot to attend the Parliament of NSW Young Women's Leadership Seminar at the NSW Parliament House, just a short walk from Macquarie Grammar.

As a live audience member, we were privileged enough to listen to a speech given by the keynote presenter, Rae Cooper, who is a Professor of Gender, Work and Employment Relations at Sydney University. She received an Order of Australia (2019) for contributions to higher education and workplace policy and practice. Listening to her research and storytelling was really interesting, and it was an insightful opportunity to hear discourse on her particular field of study, as it was clear that she had put thought and careful consideration into her replies. Her responses ranged from tips on managing the workplace to in-depth discussions surrounding the injustices faced by females in the workplace both historically and in the present day.

We also had the opportunity to hear from a panel of female Members of Parliament, who discussed the highlights, challenges, and opportunities they had experienced in their careers. The panel consisted of Labor MP Rose Jackson, Greens MP Abigail Boyd, and Liberal MP Catherine Cusack. Their responses were also well thought out and detailed, allowing for a more interesting discussion as more students asked increasingly career-specific questions.

Additionally, we also took the opportunity to have a photo taken with the members of the panel and the keynote speaker and were allowed into the Legislative Assembly to experience the unique atmosphere and history of the Chamber otherwise known as the 'bear pit'.

Overall, it was a highly enlightening day that opened up a lot of new ideas and discussion topics, and both Nadia and I are both immensely grateful for the opportunity. We'd like to thank Mrs Sun for accompanying us, Mr Rekouniotis for allowing us to go, and of course NSW Parliamentary Education for hosting the seminar. Hopefully next year, more students will be allowed to experience this wonderful opportunity for young women's leadership.

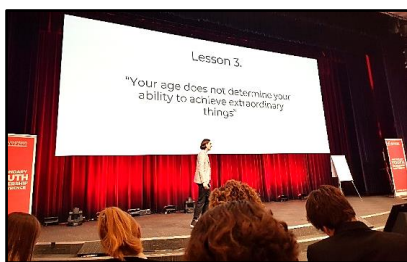

Over the last three (3) years, Maddie has been the President of the Residential Students' Department, at the University of Western Australia, as well as the Marketing Director and Vice President of the National Association of Australian University Colleges. She has presented academic sessions and training to student leadership teams and runs a safe and inclusive event on campus across the country. Now, Maddie joins the YLAA mission to empower young people to realise their potential and take control of their own education.

What impressed us the most was to hear Maddie share her personal experience, which included the difficulties she faced when she was a child, how she changed from a very shy and timid girl to such a confident public speaker. The secret is keep practising and tell yourself that you can do it and be confident about what you are going to say. If you make a mistake, don't offer apologies. Chances are that your classmates didn't notice anyway. Unless you need to correct a fact or figure, there is no point dwelling on errors that probably only you noticed. If you make a mistake because your hands are shaking, or something similar, try to make light of the situation by saying something like, "I wasn't this nervous when I woke up this morning!" This can help to break the tension of the moment.

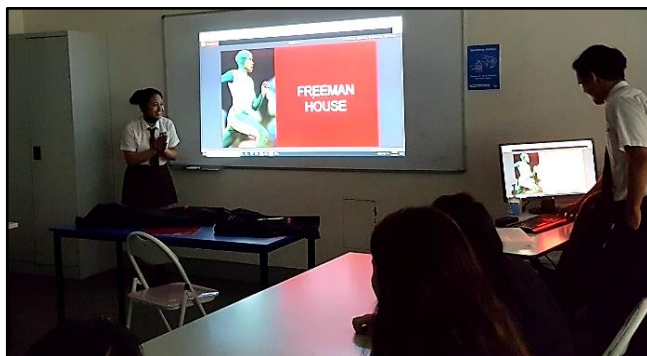

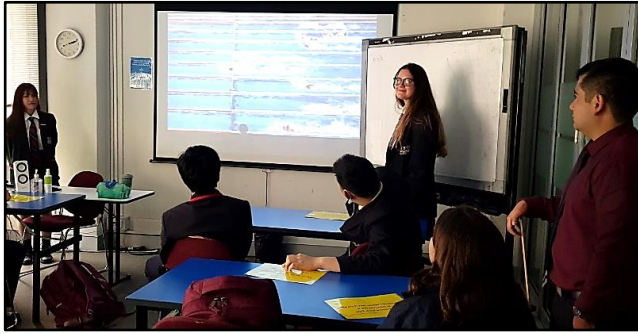

Our students in the online HSP classes actively participated in a two-week long unit discussion on the lesson ANZAC Day. Students listened to lectures, viewed documentary videos, and presented a Power point assessment on ways to celebrate and commemorate the ANZAC day.

As an extension of their learning, students were tasked to imagine themselves being a relative of an ANZAC soldier conscripted for the Gallipoli campaign. In their letter, they were to express how proud they were of their loved ones and to reassure them that everything at home front would be running smoothly. These letters were read to the class and were used as inspiration for writing their ANZAC poems following the HAIKU poetry writing convention of 5-7-5 syllables per stanza. At the end of the activity, students were encouraged to read more about the ANZAC Legend and Spirit as they continue to immerse themselves with the target language and the Australian culture and way of life.

made him ANZAC biscuits

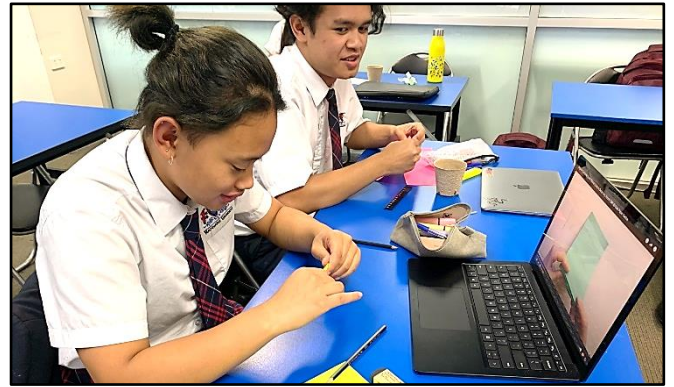

Visual Arts

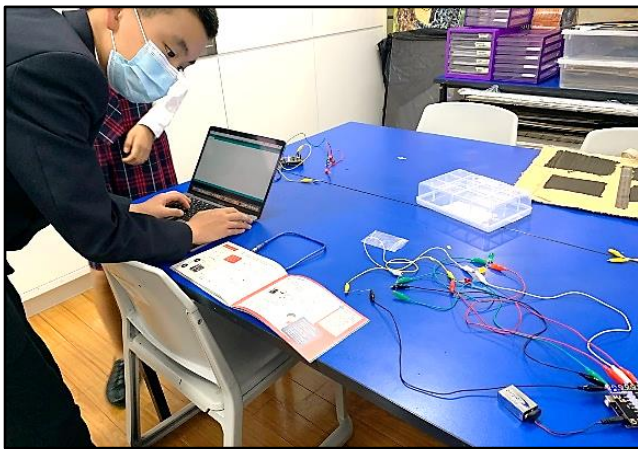
Year 7 and 8

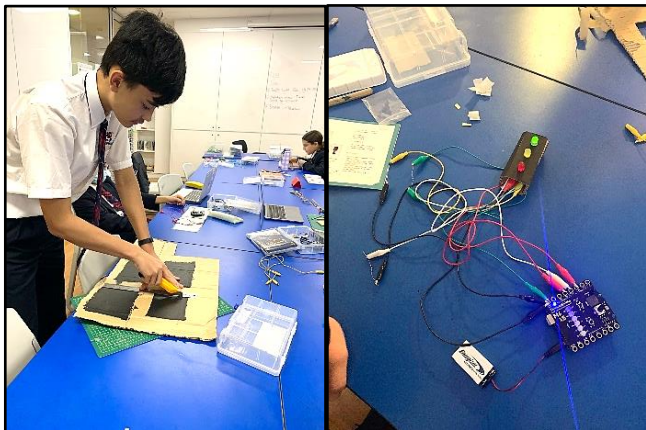


I am excited to see the completion of their first collaborative artwork and the continued engagement from students.

Year 7 and 8 Technology



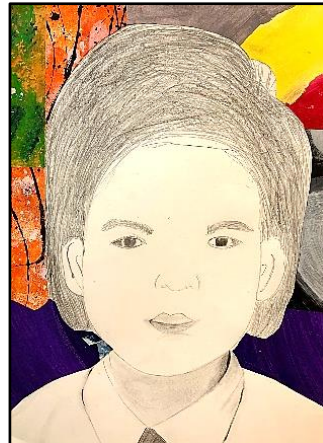

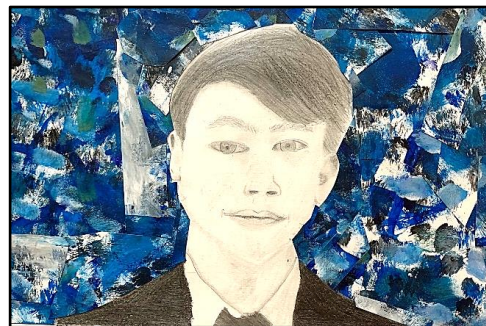

As usual, learning through hands-on activities continue to inspire a love of learning and a passion for Years 11 and 12



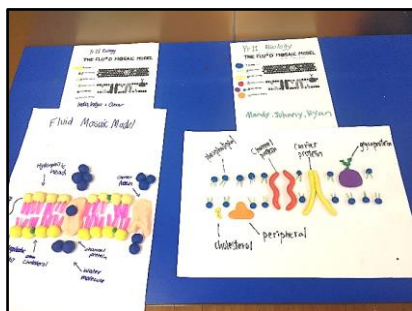
science students. Every learner is enthusiastically involved in activities in Physics, Chemistry and Biology to unleash the Scientist within them. These rich learning activities give our learners the opportunity to master four essential skills; think critically and creatively, communicate and work collaboratively. Science investigation best supports student learning and includes scientific method, fair testing, presenting science in an engaging and guided inquiry-based approach, to lift student interest.

Year 11 Biology students have been working on their unit of cells, cell organelles, cell transport and cell requirements, modelling their osmosis and fluid mosaic model of a cell membrane.



Students produced a series of work demonstrating their skills and creativity. I look forward to seeing our students develop their skills in science and producing their work to the highest standard.

Year 12 HSC students focused on completing their Body of Work by conducting primary investigations on Mutations, Biotechnology Methods and Genetic Technologies and used their time effectively in class, at home and study periods.

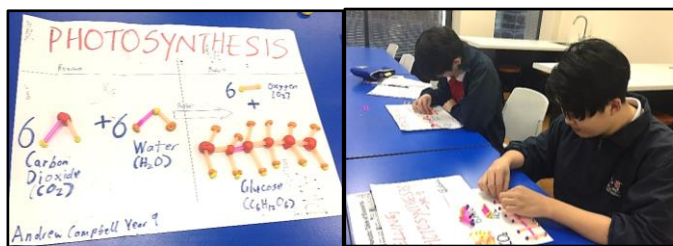


The HSC Body of Work in Science requires students to solve scientific problems using primary and secondary data, critical thinking skills and scientific processes and communicating

scientific understanding using suitable language and terminology. Students presented their work using biotechnological methods to prepare food or drink. Students will be visiting the Museum of Infectious and Non-infectious Diseases as a part of their Biology Depth of Study unit of work on Diseases. Students will gain an understanding of Museum specimens and exhibits and complete worksheets after a 45- minute presentation.

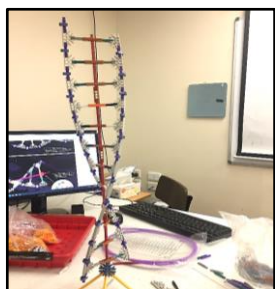

SCIENCE- YEARS 7-10



Why is science education important in our schools?

As children grow up in an increasingly technologically and scientifically advanced world, they need to be scientifically literate to succeed.

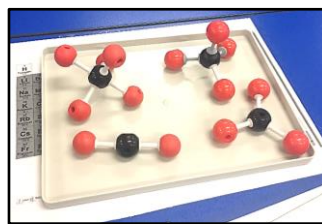


Ideally, teaching the scientific method to students is teaching them how to think, learn, solve problems, and make informed decisions. These skills are integral to every aspect of a student's education and life, from school to career.

Years 7 to 10 students have been learning Science using their multiple intelligences in Program called "Working as a Scientist". In this Program, students are required to individually design, produce, and evaluate their own science investigations and prepare their own Scientific Reports. Students have started learning to program demonstrating their skills in class and during their practical classes. Year 9 students have been working on the topic on Material and Chemical Reactions around us. They have been using



the plasticene to model Photosynthesis and Respiration in class.



Year 10 students have been working on their unit of work exploring Types of Chemical compounds, Reactions and Genetics. They have been reacting various chemicals in Science laboratory to study the products formation and

the chemical changes observed during a reaction. Students thoroughly enjoyed the smooth conduct of investigating types of reactions such as Decomposition, Replacement, Double replacement, Neutralisation and Combination Reactions.
