A key priority at Macquarie Grammar School is for every student to attend school regularly on a full-time basis.







STUDENT ABSENCE

We would like to remind parents/guardians that it is a requirement for all absences to be explained. If your child/student is absent, please let us know by either sending an email or giving us a call. Please make sure to include the student's name, class, and the reason for their absence in your message. In case your child/student has an unexplained absence, we will contact you by phone or email to ensure their safety and wellbeing. We appreciate your cooperation in this matter and look forward to working together to ensure the wellbeing of every student.

Research has shown that each day that a student is absent in secondary school has an impact on their numeracy and literacy skills. Higher student attendance is associated, on average, with higher student achievement. We follow 'Everyday Counts' policy outlined at the Monday Assembly that children achieve better when they attend school regularly on a full-time basis. Being at school means getting a better chance at life.

As a parent or guardian, it can be frustrating when your teenager seeks independence and believes they know best. One challenge that many families face is when students become reluctant or refuse to go to school. It can be a difficult situation to navigate, but it is important to remember that this is a normal part of growing up.

During these challenging times, it is crucial to support your child/student in coping with stress in effective ways. By doing so, you can help enhance their resilience. There are many ways to do this, such as encouraging them to talk about their feelings, helping them develop healthy coping strategies, and providing a safe and supportive environment. Remember that your child/student may need your guidance and support more than ever during these challenging times.

Parents should check their phones or email regularly so that they do not miss any important messages or notifications. It is advisable to check at least a few times a day, especially if you are expecting something urgent. By staying on top of your messages, you can stay organized and keep your communication channels open. Remember, communication is key!



Leaving School Early Procedure

Attending timetabled classes, including Thursday Sport and Friday Club, is essential for all students as, leaving early can contribute to total absences and impact academic results and international student requirements. Ιf visa students have exceptional circumstances and need to leave early, it is up to the principal to decide whether or not to approve the student's pass-out request. If a parent or guardian needs their child or student to leave early, they must provide a note to the office before school, signed by an authority figure, stating the student's name, class, and the reason for leaving early. Once students have the note, they must present it to the student service officer to collect their 'Early Dismissal Note', which they will need to show to their class teacher before leaving school.

Students Who Become III While At School

A student who becomes ill while at school is not to contact their parents from their mobile phone, they are to report to the student service officer from their classroom teacher. One of the student service officers will be taken care of them in sick bay and the parents/guardian will be contacted if necessary.





School Regulations

Macquarie Grammar School expects its students to wear their school uniform with pride and always be presentable. It is our expectation that the full uniform including shoes are always clean and in good condition. While students are on school grounds and in public you are setting a standard for other students. Remember that the uniform not only represents the school, but it is also a reflection of yourself. Please note:

- Boys' hair should be combed and of an acceptable length (not over the collar, ears or eyes), and must not have any artificial hair colour.
- Girls' hair should be of a natural colour, clean, well-kept, and drawn away from the face.
- Makeup is not to be worn to school, other than a very light covering of tinted sunscreen.
- No jewellery, body adornments, tattoos or piercings are allowed.
- While arriving or departing the school grounds, students must wear their blazers.

We live in a chemical world so here at Macquarie Grammar School we help our students experience some specific properties of matter in solutions. One of these properties is acidity, which can be demonstrated effectively using colourful indicators.

Student engagement in this demonstration is very high because the changes in the chemical properties can easily be observed. By comparing the colours of known chemicals such as pure water and vinegar the characteristics of the indicator chemicals can be identified and explained.






The demonstration is completed by carefully mixing chemicals in very specific quantities. With just one extra drop of the acid the colour can change dramatically right before the eyes of the students. Reversing the reaction is also possible so the students see its dynamic characteristics.

As lead science teacher here at Macquarie I have a strong focus on the engagement of students with the content areas we are teaching. Practical work here at school is very important and next term we will again visit UTS for extra experiences with specialist equipment and resources. Participating in these activities reinforces concepts that would otherwise be much less tangible.


